FROM THE CHAIRMAN

A year like no other is the best way to describe 2022. It was the year when we were released from the shackles imposed by the pandemic and many sought to make up for the loss of social interaction, a key ingredient according to current research in improving our mental and physical wellbeing. It was in this context that ICOPA worldwide embarked on the 90th anniversary celebrations with the most ambitious fundraising programme in the Association's existence embarked upon. I had not even begun my term as Chairman, ICOPA Europe when I attended the fundraising gala in Lagos at the suggestion of the then outgoing Chairman, Dr Deji Okubadejo. Little did I know he himself would be unable to attend which thrust me into the limelight as the new kid from Europe.

I again pay tribute to work of the previous Executive Committee under Deji Okubadejo's leadership in flying the flag for ICOPA Europe and working hard to make an impact on the growth and development of our alma mater, especially in raising the quality of education at Igbobi College. Right from the days of our departed brother, Dr Olumide Awe, raising the quality of education has been a flagship project (currently in the guise of the EQM) and I remain committed to following that tradition. It may not be the most prestigious, and there are no physical plaques to place on buildings, but it remains by far, the most important aspect of school life.

The year 2022 was dominated by 90th Anniversary celebrations and a large contingent from ICOPA Europe supported the activities both in Lagos early in the year, and in Atlanta, Georgia at the ICOPA North America AGM.

Our activities during the year started with the Founders' Day service at Holy Trinity Tottenham, London followed by a reception with a saxophonist in attendance. This event was supported by WICOPA who launched their new and resplendent *aso-ebi*. This was followed up by the AGM in Birmingham. In late July, we held our first Family Fun Day at Beckenham Place Park in South London which was very well attended





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by Old Igbobians and their families. Food, beverages and outdoor games were all on offer. This set the scene for our biggest event to date, the ICOBA Europe Fundraising Gala in October. To avoid repetition, this is a brief summary and the events are covered in greater detail elsewhere in this Annual Report. However, particular mention must be made of the enormous generosity and goodwill we received during the Fundraising Gala. Despite the challenges of the current economic climate many of you dug deep into your pockets. We have kept a detailed record of your generosity which is set out in the Finance Report.

When I put myself forward to stand as Chairman, I made a pledge to not only support the development of Igbobi College but to also support our members here in Europe (and the Middle East). It is quite common place for older members of school alumni to disengage for a host of reasons while younger members do not engage as they perhaps focus on growing their families and pursuing their careers. The challenge is how we can keep the Association relevant to these groups. I hope in the course of this year, now that the 90th Anniversary is done and dusted, to reach out to as many of you as possible. I am aware that many sets are going strong in the diaspora and I would love to attend your meetings if invited.

Our situation here in Europe as elsewhere in the diaspora is unique. It is difficult to find extended family support here and, as we grow older, perhaps companionship and social interaction. ICOBA (and WICOBA) here in Europe can fill that gap and we can provide multi-generational interaction to complement that found amongst one's peers. I would therefore encourage all Old Igbobians resident in Europe to engage with the Association. To this end, we have plans to launch a membership portal on the ICOBA Europe website where you can register. Information gathered will also enable us to develop a business network and promote our own businesses in the way many other migrant communities have done successfully.

Given the proven success of our Education Quality Masterplan (EQM) with results improving significantly in the last few years, I feel it would be easy for us to think that our task was done. However, history shows us that getting to the top can often be easier than staying there. In the course of last year, we set up the EQM Task Force to maintain the focus on the educational attainment of the pupils. The Task Force is made up of our immediate past Chairman, Deji Okubadejo as Chair, with Oke Eleyae and Demola Adewakun as the other members. The main term of reference is to liaise with the principal/school to ensure the teacher improvement programme continues apace and to monitor the performance of the pupils.

A large part of our fundraising drive last year was to provide much needed funds to get our ICOPA Heritage Centre project off the ground. I have appointed a planning committee which is being co-chaired by Otunba Mobolaji Falase and Rasheed Dauda, our Assistant Social Secretary. Both of them are architects and they are currently drawing up plans for the necessary modifications to the building. ICOPA International has requested that we put in a joint proposal with ICOPA North America who have also expressed an interest in re-developing the library on the first floor which is now in disuse and has not had a librarian for a number of years. In the course of the year, we hope to share the plans with you. I suspect that the unseen challenge will be the collection of historical documents, school uniforms from the past and photographs in the hands of Old Igbobians which can either be lent or donated to the project for display. We will need your help in this regard.

Finally, it will be remiss of me not to mention briefly our upcoming events:

- ▶ Family Fun Day to be held jointly with Methodist Girls High School Old Girls Association UK, Ireland and Europe at Beckenham Place Park in South London on the 29th of July 2023.
- ▶ The 4th Dr Olumide Awe Memorial Lecture/Dinner & Dance to be held at the London Hilton Watford on the 4th of November 2023. More information will be published in due course.
- ▶ ICOPA Europe Elections in late November 2023.

Our Association is blessed with great individuals with considerable talent that is combined with an unrivalled passion for our alma mater. During the course of 2022, this was very clearly demonstrated by both Old Igbobians and members of WICOPA whose dedication allowed us to make a very significant contribution to the 90th Anniversary Celebrations by ICOPA worldwide. We have also received support from those outside of our Association here in Europe, most notably from ICOPA North America and ICOPA International. I am most grateful and inspired by you all and pledge to continue to serve the Association with dedication and commitment.

FROM THE SECRETARIAT



EXCO MEETINGS, BUSINESS MEETING AND ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING (AGM)

I. The secretariat hosted 6 meetings of ICOBA Europe Executive Committee (EXCO) meetings in 2022 mainly held remotely respectively on 15 January, 30 April, 25 August and 4 October save for the meetings of 5 March (held in Croydon at Mr Gbenga Segun's residence) and 21 May (held at the residence of Dr Deji Okubadejo in Solihull).

II. The Secretariat facilitated the 2022 Annual General Meeting (AGM) which was hosted by the Birmingham members of ICOBA Europe and held at the Church Hall of St Johns Church Walmley, Sutton Coldfield. The AGM was attended by 27 members of which 4 members joined virtually and 2 observers also joined virtually from Nigeria and the USA.

The meeting discussed the 2021 Annual Report submitted by ICOBA Europe EXCO which was also used as a vital fund raising tool at the 90th Founders Day Gala Celebrations held on 8 October 2022. The AGM also discussed the importance of the ICOBA Europe's flagship sponsorship project to the College Education Quality Master Plan (EQM) in raising standards at the College's academic excellence.

The address of Olumuyiwa Kinoshi IMR President ICOBA International was read to the meeting by Otunba Bolaji Falase, 2nd Vice President, ICOBA International and Past Chairman, ICOBA Europe. The AGM was also briefed on ICOBA Europe's Calendar of Activities including the 90th Founders Day Anniversary Celebrations for the year 2022 by Adekunle Adeniji, ICOBA Europe Secretary.

Dr Deji Okubadejo, Chairman of OBIC gave an update on the purpose of OBIC as ICOBA Europe's Charitable Arm. Otunba Falase provided a briefing on the Museum Project sponsored at the College by ICOBA Europe.

Gbenga Segun, Chairman ICOBA Europe and Adekunle Adeniji appraised the meeting of current initiatives including the Millennium Engagement Group to attract and encourage more participation from members at ICOBA Europe events.

Femi Awotesu 77/79 SET briefed the meeting on his discussion paper titled ICOBA Europe – Engagement with the Nigerian Chaplaincy and the Nigerian Methodist Chaplaincy following which in a motion proposed by Chief Femi Onabolu 59/61 SET Should ICOBA Europe if the AGM decides is it in our interest to develop formal relationships with the Chaplaincies, YES or NO, the majority of members voted NO.

III. ICOBA Europe held its Business Meeting on Saturday 8th October 2022 at Hilton London Watford Elton Way Watford on the morning of the 90th Founders Day Gala Night. The meeting was briefed on the activities of WICOBA by Mrs Folake Segun.

Dr Okubadejo provided updates on the progress of the EQM and OBIC. Gbenga Segun, Chairman ICOBA Europe informed the meeting on the objectives of the Heritage Centre (ICOBA Museum).

In his address to the meeting read by Otunba Falase, Mr Olumuyiwa Kinoshi applauded ICOPA Europe on their success in hosting the 90th Founders Day Celebration in Watford.

Wale Gbalajobi, Chairman ICOPA North America (ICOBANA) informed the meeting on ICOBANA's activities including its proposed library project at the College Legacy Block which would also house ICOPA Europe's project the Heritage Centre.

Co-Chairmen ICOPA International 90th Anniversary Committee, Otunba Mobolaji Falase and Mr Femi Olubanwo outlined the global activities and events already and planned during the course of the year to mark the College's 90th Founders Day.

Jeremy Coker, ICOPA Europe Vice Chairman and Chairman ICOPA Europe Anniversary Committee informed the meeting on the 3 day activities which commenced the day before with WICOPA 'Denim and Diamonds' Hosts event, the Gala Night later in the evening on the day of the meeting and the thanksgiving service tomorrow on Sunday 9 October. He also informed the meeting on the fundraising targets set by ICOPA Europe for the College's 90th Founders Day.

The Education Quality Masterplan (EQM) remains a flagship project of ICOBA Europe. The programme began in August 2019 with the objective of improving the quality of teaching and learning at Igbobi College Yaba (ICY). EQM is being implemented in two phases with the first phase being a 2-year school turnaround effort and the second phase being the process of embedding EQM as business as usual at ICY with ongoing teacher training and support. The programme saw early good results especially in the level of engagement of the school academic team and their ability to quickly take ownership and put their learning into effect with the production of annual school development plans - this was novel to the institution. The end of the second year also saw dramatic improvements in the performance of ICY students at exit external examinations.

On assuming office in February 2022, the new executive committee of ICOBA Europe decided that the best way to achieve the objectives of the second phase of EQM was to set up an EQM task-force to take the work forward. ICOBA Europe chairman, Mr Gbenga Segun, in March 2022, constituted the EQM task-force (EQM-TF) with the following as members

- ▶ Dr Deji Okubadejo (74-79/81) — Chairman
- ▶ Mr Oke Eleyae (73-78/80)
- ▶ Mr Demola Adewakun (77-81/83)

The intention is that ICOBA Europe does not lose the invaluable knowledge and experience that had been accumulated over the preceding years. The terms of reference of the EQM-TF are

- ▶ The implementation of Phase 2 of EQM
- ▶ Continuous monitoring and evaluation of EQM against set targets
- ▶ Increasing the profile of EQM with the aim of growing support from the wider ICOBA family
- ▶ Managing the funds allocated to EQM to achieve maximum results
- ▶ Working collaboratively with the Igbobi College Board of Governors, the Principal of the school and the wider ICOBA family in pursuit of the objectives of EQM.

EQM-TF operates under the umbrella of the executive committee of ICOBA Europe.

REPORTS & MEETINGS

Members of the EQM-TF have engaged with the academic team at ICY, providing adequate levels of support and challenge along the journey of continuous improvement in the quality of education. As part of the ongoing implementation of EQM, the principal and the senior leadership team of ICY have committed to sharing the regular reports from each term with ICOBA Europe through the EQM-TF. We have therefore received reports for the second and third terms of the 2021/22 academic year. It has been the practice that these reports are analysed and that feedback is given to the ICY senior leadership team via a formal report and an online meeting. These meetings have been very well received and the school team have reported that they have found them useful even if challenging at times.

Analysis shows that the school continues the good practice of monitoring students' performance, tracking and comparing performance in internal examinations to show student progress during the academic year. This helps the school fine-tune the support and intervention provided in order to improve students' achievement. Challenge has been provided concerning the interpretation of trends and the process of management of discrepancies and deviations from expectations. There are concerns about

students' performance moving from A* and A to C or P in some subjects but the school team continues to provide assurance that the school's expectation remains that students will achieve A* and A in most subjects. The EQM-TF has also been able to identify and applaud other areas of good teaching practice at ICY. The school identifies high-achievers and it is heartening to note that the percentage of high-achievers has doubled in each of the school-year cohorts for which data was available. The expectation is that the predicted number of A* and B grades should be higher this year than in the previous year. The number of students to teacher ratio is low and this provides a great opportunity for the school to continue to maintain all students achieving no less than A* to C, with more students achieving the higher grades.

One other problem that has been noted is that the term reports have not been received in a contemporaneous manner. This has been raised as a concern with the principal and with the Board of Governors and we have been promised that this will be improved upon. It is important to mention that the EQM-TF has maintained communication with the chairman of the Board of Governors and the chair of the education committee of the board to nurture relationships, understand operational vision and achieve a shared understanding with the board. We were also pleased to note that individual subject leads take ownership of their sections of the school development plan.

TEACHER TRAINING PROGRAMME

ICOPA Europe continues to facilitate teacher training through the Teacher Training Network (TTN). It was however noticed, during the summer of 2022, that the expected full programme of training that was to have been delivered in 2021/22 had not been delivered. Contact was made with the training provider and it was agreed that the outstanding training sessions would be delivered before the end of 2022 and this was completed. Following conversations with the ICY team, confirmation was received that the TTN programme is appropriate for their needs and met their training requirements. They have recommended that TTN continues to provide the training for the 2023 year. Many will remember that ICOPA Europe has committed to funding this training until 2029 as part of the implementation of phase 2 of EQM. The academic team at ICY also continue to run their own internal teacher development sessions and peer review.

PAST EXAMINATIONS PROJECT

The EQM-TF has introduced a past examinations project to the school. This programme will provide past examinations papers online and allow students to access these for practice with a result that students are able to receive feedback on their level of knowledge as well as gaps that exist. It will also allow teachers to track the progress of students and identify gaps in parts of the curriculum so that these gaps can be dealt with. It has been agreed that the EQM-TF will develop this and make it available with information and guidance for students, teachers and parents. Students can then access the programme in their own time and learn at their own pace.

CONCLUSION

EQM continues at pace at ICY and the academic team, and the school board of governors, are committed to embedding this as business-as-usual at the school. Engagement with the programme remains good and meetings with the senior leadership team demonstrate enthusiasm and progress with EQM and there is measurable progress in the academic achievements of students of ICY with clear evidence of transformation going on in the school system translating into improved learning as well as fantastic results. The EQM-TF will continue to work in providing support and challenge to the senior leadership team at ICY to drive continuous improvement.

OBIC UK



OBIC UK is a company limited by guarantee that was incorporated in October 2020. It was set up by ICOBA Europe in order to develop the charitable activities of the association. The main objective of OBIC UK is to work within the black community in the UK to improve the educational attainment of children in this community. The directors of OBIC UK are

- ▶ Dr Adedeji Okubadejo (74–79/81) — Chairman
- ▶ Mr Yusuf Kuti (73–78/80)
- ▶ Mr Jeremy Coker (74–79/81)
- ▶ Mr Oluseye Oyediran (74–79/81)
- ▶ Otunba Oladele Osinuga (85/87)

The plan is for OBIC UK to develop a profile of activities that will allow it to apply for and obtain status as a charitable organisation in the UK. Once achieved, this will make it the charitable arm of ICOBA Europe.

Records show that at GCSE level, young people from the Black major ethnic group, on average, have the lowest combined English and maths pass rate of any major ethnic group. The aim of OBIC UK is to explore the issues surrounding this and to provide targeted input to help improve educational attainment. We are also having conversations with partners that we hope to be able to work with towards achieving our identified objectives. OBIC UK has recently commissioned a report of the issues influencing the underperformance of black children in the UK especially in primary education.

Progress at OBIC UK has however been very slow. The organisation has been hampered from operating due to difficulties with opening a bank account as processes were adversely affected in there banking industry by the COVID-19 pandemic. There are ongoing plans and efforts to overcome this problem so that OBIC UK can be fully functional. ICOBA Europe has dedicated the sum of £5,000 as operational start-up capital to OBIC UK.

FINANCE



The year 2022 proved, undoubtedly, to be the most financially-active so far for ICOPA Europe. We celebrated the 90th Anniversary of the founding of Igbobi College, and its highlight was a Gala weekend held in October. The weekend was the main event underpinning an ambitious fundraising effort, being ICOPA Europe's contribution towards the global N1billion target set for raising funds for Igbobi College. It is meet for us to express sincere gratitude to all old Igbobians and friends of the College who demonstrated commendable generosity in supporting our fundraising drive. We include those who took part in the Kolo Challenge which proved to be a fun way of involving friends and family in our fundraising endeavours.

The gross amount raised by ICOPA Europe during the 90th Anniversary celebrations was £84,054. The funds raised, net of expenses, will be used to fund the Heritage Centre Project which is discussed in the Chairman's Report.

As a direct result of the fundraising activities for the 90th Anniversary, the Association achieved a surplus of £52,382, most of which is expected to be appropriated towards the Heritage Centre.

There has been a reduction in membership subscriptions (43 subscribers in 2022 compared to 52 in 2021). It is assumed the drop is due to the focus on 90th Anniversary fundraising. We appeal to members to continue fulfilling their subscription obligations, as this is how business-as-usual activities of the Association are funded.

Members are also reminded that our flagship initiative — the Educational Quality Masterplan (EQM) — is ongoing. We encourage members to continue the financial support of the EQM.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Subscriptions

Subscriptions are accounted for in the period in which they are received, or where specified for subscriptions received after the balance sheet date, in the period they relate to.

Donations

Donations received for the general purpose of the Association are credited to Unrestricted Funds in the period in which they are received.

Depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulative depreciation and any accumulative impairment losses. Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset evenly over its expected useful life, as follows:

Plant and machinery 25% straight line

Designated funds

Designated funds relate to amounts set aside for designated projects to benefit the college and are disbursed in accordance with the terms of the applicable restrictions.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. Overhead and other costs not directly attributable to particular functional activity categories are apportioned over the relevant categories on the basis of the committee's estimates of the amount attributable to that activity in the period as appropriate.

Reserves

The Association's objective is to build its reserves, in the form of unrestricted funds, to a level where they equate in value to approximately twelve months direct expenditure, thereby providing the Association with a reasonably secure financial base on which to plan future projects and to commit to related expenditures, before external funding has been fully secured.
